Step 1

Heat oven to 190C and line a baking tray with baking parchment. Sieve the flour, salt, bicarb, ginger and cinnamon into a large bowl. Heat the butter, sugar and syrup until dissolved. Leave the sugar mixture to cool slightly, then mix into the dry ingredients to form a dough. Chill the dough in the fridge for 30 mins.

Step 2

On a surface lightly dusted with flour, roll out the dough to a ¼-inch thickness. Stamp out the gingerbread shapes with a cutter. Place your gingerbread shapes on the tray. Cook for 10-15 mins, then remove from the oven and leave to cool.

CANADA

9.0 D

Canada covers 9.98 million square kilometres, which makes it the world's second largest country. With more lakes than the rest of the world combined, the longest coastline, volcanoes, deserts, cliffs and glaciers, Canadian landscapes are truly remarkable. Most of the country is untouched by human development, which gives wildlife favourable conditions in its own natural territory and makes Canada perfect for adventurers and nature lovers.

9.1 ____

For thousands of years, native peoples inhabited the country. Some lived off the land, hunting and raising crops. The Sioux, however, were nomadic and followed the buffalo herds, and the Inuit lived off Arctic wildlife. The different aboriginal groups competed for land, resources and prestige. The arrival of the European colonists changed the native ways of life forever. The indigenous peoples were named Indians because the first explorers thought they had landed in India.

9.2 ____

European exploration of North America began in the 1500s, when British and French expeditions sailed across the Atlantic Ocean and settled along the Atlantic coast. By the 1550s, the name Canada began appearing on maps. As a consequence of English colonies eventually becoming richer and more popular than the French, France left North America in 1763. However, it was not until 1867 that the Republic of Canada became independent.

9.3 ____

There are over 30 different languages spoken by aboriginal people in Canada, but many of these languages are in decline. Several of the native peoples have lost their languages, and English is today the most commonly spoken language. Anishinaabe and Cree are, however, still spoken by 150,000 speakers. The country has two official languages: English and French. Two of Canada's territories also give official status to native languages.

9.4 ____

Whenever you see the maple leaf, Canada comes to mind. The maple tree is very important to Canadians and closely tied to, for example, the country's flag, sports teams' emblems and coats of arms. But why a maple leaf? For years, the indigenous peoples used maple sap as a very important product in their basic food, and as early as 1700, it was seen as a Canadian icon. Today, the maple tree continues to be essential to Canada as it provides three-quarters of the world's maple syrup production.

9.5 ____

Officially, Canada has two state sports: lacrosse for summer and ice hockey for winter. Lacrosse has developed from the early aboriginal game baggataway, originally played by the Ojimwa people to train young warriors for battle. Ice hockey is now incredibly popular and played year-round by all age groups at every level. For years, Canada has dominated ice hockey at the Winter Olympics.

There are certain people you might know who are Canadian, like Avril Lavigne, Justin Bieber, The Weeknd and Drake, just to mention a few. Before Drake became a famed rap artist, he starred as a child actor in "Degrassi: The Next Generation." 1 From time to time, the news reminds us of the adventurous men and women who have explored the world over the last many centuries. The Vikings reached North America
5 more than 1000 years ago. The year 2020 marked the 250th anniversary of Captain James Cook's arrival at Botany Bay in Australia in 1770. These explorers and many more have contributed to our understanding of our life on
10 Earth and our fascination to learn more about it.

The explorers met so-far uncontacted populations, discovered new species of animals, or tested their physical endurance at the tops of mountains and depths of oceans.

15 And we might be forgiven for asking ourselves: What is there left to explore? Is there anything "new" to be found? Yes, of course there is.

Enter the travel vlogger! Travel vloggers are a (growing) group of people, mostly young, who
20 film their trips and publish their experiences online. They hope that other travel enthusiasts will see their videos on YouTube or other social media and perhaps feel inspired to do something similar.

25 Most travel vloggers are individual young people or couples who do not have enough money for big expeditions or perhaps even for expensive plane tickets to exotic corners of the world. They don't necessarily visit new places,
30 but they communicate about their travels in new ways. Modern filming and editing technology has brought the relevant equipment within financial reach and has given ordinary young people a voice. They communicate
35 about their travel experiences in immediate and personal ways that many can identify with. Some give advice and suggestions for travel, others use their journeys as an opportunity to share their philosophy of life and reflect on life
40 and society.

The most successful travel vloggers can earn a lot of money from advertisements on their videos and some of them end up travelling full time. Their way of life is very different from that
45 experienced on the expeditions of past decades and centuries, but perhaps we can regard these vloggers as the global explorers of the 21st century. What do YOU think?
